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Augmented reality at the Wynn School

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TEWKSBURY — District Technology Integration Specialist and Coach Lisa Bailey was instantly intrigued when she learned about augmented reality. Bailey had been interested in how she could use virtual technology and augmented reality in the classroom and was inspired after attending a session at the MassCUE (Massachusetts Computer Using Educators) conference in November.

She had been looking for an opportunity to incorporate the technology and wound up collaborating with 7th grade teachers Holly Germain and Jon DiPrima. A combined physical education and writing project brought Germain, a physical education teacher and DiPrima, the writing teacher, together with Bailey, who was delighted with their willingness to give the technology a try.

Augmented reality is a way to use computer technology to layer an image or images onto the real world we are experiencing. A familiar example would be the lines that appear on a football broadcast showing the line that has to be crossed for a team to make the next down. The computer seamlessly lays a line on the field for the viewer without interrupting their enjoyment of the game. In the school example, a one dimensional poster comes to life when a device is held up to it.

Bailey described the project in the following way:

"During this cross-curricular project, the students created interactive, augmented reality posters to demonstrate a physical activity using the ACES (answer, cite, explain, summarize) method for written responses."

For example, a student interested in fencing made a colorful display which incorporated illustration, a written explanation, and a photograph of the student fencing. A "target" is placed on the static picture and then a visitor holds a tablet up to the poster, the software centers on the target, and magically a short video pops up and the student is actually fencing with another student.

"The work on display in the Gallery Walk is a product of our professional collaboration in an effort to showcase student knowledge, research, and demonstrations utilizing technology," she said.

Bailey is excited about the success of the project.

"The use of AR in the classroom changes the way students access information, therefore making learning more motivating, engaging, and exciting. AR, experiencing it as well as creating it, gives us the opportunity to modify and redefine what has traditionally been done in the classroom."

And, Bailey was proud to use technology and hardware the district already had.

"Last year, through a generous donation from the Tewksbury Education Foundation, Principal John Weir was able to purchase 12 iPads and a portable green screen studio for the middle school teachers to sign out and utilize with their students," she said.

For this project, the students and teachers used the iPads to photograph the triggers and videotape the overlays for the augmented reality. As an option, students had the opportunity to use the green screen technology to add another layer to their project and make it appear that they were in a different location demonstrating their skill.

Bailey explained that the possibilities are endless with AR through extensive apps which cover a range of subject. The Wynn library also has interactive books about the brain, ocean, germs, bugs, etc. which student and teachers may use, thanks to library coordinator Lori Carriere, who has worked with Bailey. The books incorporate AR and bring the information to life on a tablet or smartphone.


Bailey looks forward to sharing this technology with other schools in the district to explore how it can enhance the classroom experience.



Sparking Interest in STEM Careers in Middle School

The Future STEM Workforce

According to the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (https://www.bls.gov.spotlight.2017 science-technology-engineering-and-mathematics-stem-occupations-past-present-and-future home html, "over 800,000 new STEM jobs were added to the U.S. economy" between May 2009 and May 2015, and "ninety-three out of 100 STEM occupations had wages significantly above the national average wage." It is clear that there is considerable opportunity for students who pursue STEM, but will there be enough interested students?

Sources continue to predict a significant shortage of STEM employees to meet growing workforce demand, particularly in computer science and health fields. Even more alarming is the U.S. Department of Education (https://www.ed.gov.stem)'s claim that only 16 percent of high school students are interested in STEM-related careers. The future of the U.S. STEM workforce depends upon schools, teachers, programs, and organizations reaching students in meaningful ways with career information that both sparks interest and enables students to see themselves with a future in STEM.

Creating Opportunities for Students to Explore STEM Careers

Sparking student interest in STEM careers is key, and the earlier students start thinking about the wide range of STEM careers, the better. Kids are asked from the time they are little what they want to be when they grow up. Middle school is not too early to encourage students to survey STEM career paths and explore possibilities that may still be years away. Career-focused school projects like that of Sue Spollen, a computer teacher in Tewksbury, MA, have the potential to engage students at a pivotal point in their education and may make a real difference in how students think about their future.

Spollen is a dedicated computer teacher for sixth grade at John F. Ryan Elementary School. Every week, Spollen works with 270 sixth-grade students in the school's computer lab, where they focus broadly on computer and digital literacy skills. Students passing through Spollen's lab learn and practice keyboard skills, get exposure to computer science, and work on projects that synthesize and reinforce other areas of academic learning, like writing, research, and communication skills.

One of the computer-based projects Spollen does with students each year focuses on careers. As part of the project, her sixth-grade students do a personal interest assessment, survey careers, and choose a career to report on. Spollen says she has been assigning a career project for eight years, but this was the first year that she focused the project on STEM careers. Shifting the assignment to have students narrow in on options in science, technology, engineering, and math was a change that supports district-wide educational goals and her own desire to expose students to the wide range of STEM careers available.

STEM careers "provide excellent future opportunities," says Spollen, and in the introduction to the STEM Career assignment, she tells her middle school students, "STEM jobs are expected to be plentiful in the future, so it is beneficial for you to understand the type of STEM job that best fits your interests and strengths."

STEM Career Information at Science Buddies

In preparing this year's STEM-focused career assignment, Spollen integrated Science Buddies' Careers in Science profiles

(http://www.sciencebuddies.org.science-engineering-careers?from=Blog) into the project. The career section (http://www.sciencebuddies.org.science-engineering-careers?from=Blog) of the Science Buddies website features more than 150 popular careers in a range of STEM fields. Each profile has been developed to maximize student understanding of what the job entails and the educational path that leads to that career. Career profiles provide salary projections, a short list of companies that hire in that area, education requirements, and "a day in the life" summaries to help students better understand what someone in a specific job does. Career profiles also include videos, photos, and interviews with employees in the field to help illustrate the career.

Spollen says that the Science Careers area at Science Buddies was a good fit for her project. "It is STEM-focused, provided a good selection of careers to choose from, and was easy to navigate/understand."

Imagine Yourself in a STEM Job

To complete Spotlen's career assignment, students work through a series of online steps, learning to take screenshots and navigate websites as part of the process. Spotlen breaks the assignment into two parts, general exploration and research. In the exploration stage, students use online tools and surveys to help them understand their own strengths and interests and to help them narrow in on areas of STEM that may be of particular interest. Students then move on to the research part of the assignment.

They begin this portion of the project at Science Buddies, browsing the Science Careers area (http://www.sciencebuddies.org/scienceengineering-careers?from=Blog) of the site and looking at careers in Earth & Physical Sciences (https://www.sciencebuddies.org/science-engineeringcareers?from=Blog#earthchys calsciences, Life Sciences (https://www.sciencebuddies.org/science-engineeringcareers?from=Blog#earthchys calscience-engineering-careers?from=Blog#engineering, Math & Computer Science (https://www.sciencebuddies.org/science-engineeringcareers?from=Blog#mathcomputerscience|, and Health (https://www.sciencebuddies.org/science-engineering-careers?from=Blog#health). In the project directions,
Spollen highlights a few areas of potential interest (e.g., arts, sports, and cooking) and links those areas of interest to careers
students might want to research on the Science Buddies site. For example, a student interested in sports might research careers
like Diver onto www.sciencebuddies.org/science-engineering-careers/life-sciences/arthchys/sciences/arthchys/sciences/arthchys/sciences/arthchys/sciences/compBlog/ (Environmental Science), Athletic Trainer

After identifying and choosing one career of interest, students do additional research on the career and create a multi-slide presentation using Google Slides. The slideshow requirement helps reinforce software skills as well as emphasizes content, organization, and strong writing skills. Spollen notes that the slideshow is not a creative project but is, instead, an orderly presentation of the student's research on a chosen career. (Students have the opportunity to add color and images to enhance their presentation as a follow-up assignment.) By the end of the project, students in Spollen's class have surveyed a number of careers and taken a closer look at a STEM career of possible interest and maybe discovered a career path that will shape how they think about the future.

When asked about the value of talking about STEM careers with middle school students, Spollen notes the importance of connecting classroom learning to real-world careers. "I spent 14 years in the computer industry before becoming a teacher," says Spollen. "I am also certified in math. Career awareness is extremely important in middle school so they understand 'why am I learning this in math?' Also, students need to know what types of jobs will be in demand/growing so they can focus on the improving the skills they need, as well as reset their growth mindset."

Policy

File: EFD - PAYMENT-FOR-FOOD SERVICES MEAL CHARGE POLICY

The School Committee is committed to providing students with healthy, nutritious meals each day so they can focus on school work, while also maintaining the financial integrity of meal programs and minimizing any impact on students with meal charges. However, unpaid meal charges place a large financial burden on the school district, as food services is a self-supporting entity within the district. The purpose of this policy is to ensure compliance with federal reporting requirements of the USDA Child Nutrition Program, as well as provide oversight and accountability for the collection of outstanding student meal balances.

The provisions of this policy pertain to regular priced school meals only. The School Committee will provide a regular meal to students who forget or lose their lunch money.

Meal Charges and Balances

Grades K through 6-limits students to three-charged-menu-meals (\$8.25). The individual student will enter their PIN number and the system will charge them for the price of one-lunch, which will appear as a debit on their account. Only-reimbursable-lunches and milk are available as a charge.

Grades 7 through 8-limits-student-to-two-charged-menu meals (\$6.00).

No-charging allowed at High School.

Students should NOT-be-allowed-to-charge any a la carte items. If a student-charges a lunch, that student should not-be-purchasing any "extra" items.

Any-student whose account is at the charge limit and does not-bring a lunch from home that student will be offered an alternative cold-reimbursable meal (i.e., sandwich-or-yogurt, with fruit, vegetable and milk).

Students will pay for meals at the regular rate approved by the Tewksbury School Committee and for their meal status (regular, reduced-price, or free) each day. Payment options will be delineated in student handbooks and provided to parents of incoming students. After the balance reaches zero and enters the negative, students will not be allowed to purchase a la carte items including but not limited to a second entrée, snack, ice cream, or an additional beverage. The student will still be allowed to take a meal, and that meal will continue to be charged to the account at the standard lunch rate based on their meal status. The parent/guardian is responsible for any meal charges incurred. If there is a financial hardship, a parent/guardian should contact the Tewksbury Food Services directly to discuss payment options such as an individualized repayment plan.

Payments

Students that have charged meal(s)-will-receive a charge notice from Food-Service which will be sent home weekly to the household. These will be in a sealed envelope.

If the charge has not been paid by the third-week, Food Service will-place a call to the parent-in case the written notice was not received. Parents/Guardians are responsible for all meal payments

to the Tewksbury Food Service Program. Notices of low or deficit balances will be sent directly to parent/guardians via email or regular postal mail at regular intervals during the school year. At no time shall any staff member give payment notices to students unless that student is known to be an emancipated minor who is fully responsible for themselves or over the age of 18. If parent/guardians have issues with student purchases they should contact food services for assistance.

If the charge is still carried over after the third week, Food Service will notify the school Principal and send-a letter along with a free and reduced meals application home to the household, ee Principal.

If parent or guardian continues to carry a balance or doesn't provide lunch money to a student and who does not qualify for the free or reduced meal benefits, the Principal or Business Manager will be informed by Food Service to determine course of action. The point of sale system is designed to prevent direct identification of a student's meal status. Parents will receive automated low-balance emails or mailed notices weekly, if applicable. If notices do not result in payment, parents will receive a phone call from the Tewksbury Food Services. If the phone call does not result in payment the Food Service Manager shall turn the account over to the Business Office. A record of action shall be kept by Food Service to ensure documentation of the process.

Parents/Guardians may pay for meals in advance. Further details are available on the Tewksbury Public Schools' webpage and in student handbooks. Funds should be maintained in accounts to minimize the possibility that a child may be without meal money on any given day. Any remaining funds for a particular student, whether positive or negative, will be carried over to the next school year.

All school cafeterias possess computerized point of sale/cash register systems that maintain records of all monies deposited and spent for each student and those records are available to parents by setting up an online account (see student handbooks for more details) or by speaking with the school's Food Service Manager.

Refunds

Refunds for withdrawn and/or graduating students require a written request (email, postal, or in person) for a refund of any money remaining in their account to be submitted. Graduating students also have the option to transfer funds to a sibling's account or to donate to a student in need with a written request.

Delinquent Accounts/Collections

Failure to maintain up to date accounts may result in a delay of a student's extra-curricular school services, especially those that are fee based. Graduating seniors may lose the ability to participate in certain graduation related activities.

The Superintendent shall ensure that there are appropriate and effective collection procedures and internal controls within the Tewksbury Public Schools' Business Office that meet the requirements of law.

If a student is without meal money on a consistent basis, the administration may investigate the situation more closely and take further action as needed. If financial hardship exists, parents and families are encouraged to apply for free or reduced price lunches for their child. Each school handbook shall contain detailed instructions for parental assistance.

Policy Communications

This policy shall be communicated to all staff and families at the beginning of each school year and to families transferring to the district during the year.

AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE TEWKSBURY SCHOOL DISTRICT AND

JAY S. HARDING LOUISE DAVY TRAHAN ELEMENTARY SCHOOL PRINCIPAL

Agreement made effective July 30, 2018 by and between the Tewksbury School District, Middlesex County, in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts (hereinafter referred to as the "District" and Jay D. Harding. Said District has and does hereby employ said Jay Harding as an ELEMENTARY SCHOOL PRINCIPAL. Both parties agree that said employee (hereinafter referred to as "Mr. Harding") shall perform the duties of Elementary School Principal as prescribed by the laws of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts and by the rules, regulations, and policies made thereunder by the Tewksbury School Committee under the direction of the Superintendent.

The parties hereto agree as follows:

SECTION ONE EMPLOYMENT

1.01 The District hereby employs Mr. Harding as an ELEMENTARY SCHOOL PRINCIPAL, in Tewksbury, MA. Mr. Harding hereby accepts such employment on the following terms and conditions. Mr. Harding is hereby assigned to the Louise Davy Trahan Elementary School. The assignment may be changed by the Superintendent based on the needs of the Tewksbury Public Schools, including but not limited to reorganization of school districts, school closings or re-configurations of grades attending the school or schools to which Mr. Harding is assigned.

SECTION TWO TERM

- 2.01 The Principal shall be employed for the period commencing July 30, 2018 and ending June 30, 2021, unless sooner terminated as herein provided.
- 2.02 In the event that the Superintendent decides not to extend the contract, the principal agrees this provision constitutes notice of expiration or non-renewal of the agreement effective June 30, 2021, said notice issued pursuant to M.G.L. c.71 §41.
- 2.03 This agreement constitutes notice that, in the absence of a written agreement, this agreement will not automatically extend or be renewed after June 30, 2021. The principal agrees this provision constitutes notice of expiration or non-renewal of the agreement effective June 30, 2021, said notice issued pursuant to M.G.L. c 71 §41.

SECTION THREE COMPENSATION

3.01 The District agrees to pay the Principal, in consideration of the faithful, diligent and competent performance of his duties and responsibilities as provided herein and in the statutes and regulations of the Commonwealth, at the following annual rates of pay:

TEWKSBURY PUBLIC SCHOOLS CONTRACT OF EMPLOYMENT DAVID LIBBY

This contract, or any successor agreement, is made between the Tewksbury Public Schools, through the Superintendent of Schools, hereinafter referred to as the "Superintendent", and David Libby, hereinafter referred to as the "Administrator." In consideration of the promises herein contained, the parties agree as follows:

WHEREAS, the parties wish to enter into an employment agreement between them for Mr. Libby's services as Business Manager; and

WHEREAS, this agreement sets forth the terms and conditions pertaining to Mr. Libby's employment with the District; and

WHEREAS, the term of said agreement and any subsequent amendments continues to June 30, 2021; and

WHEREAS, the parties are mutually desirous of specifying certain of the terms of said agreement and moralizing those terms which are not expressly modified herein;

NOW THEREFORE, the parties hereto hereby as follows;

1. <u>Duration and Termination</u>: The Administrator's agreement shall be effective as of July 11, 2018 and conditionally extended through June 30, 2021. At the end of the 2020-2021 school year the Superintendent may offer a one year extension at his discretion. In the event the Administrator wishes to terminate this agreement, he may do so by giving ninety (90) days written notice.

The parties agree that all disputes relative to termination of this contract by the Committee will be resolved by final and binding arbitration in accordance with the Labor and Arbitration Rules of the American Arbitration Association. Initiation of arbitration shall occur only by filing a written demand therefore with the other party and the American Arbitration Association within 21 calendar days of the date of notice of discharge. In no case may an arbitrator apply any definition of the words "good cause" except as same were interpreted by Massachusetts' courts prior to June 18, 1993, and as contained in M.G.L. c. 71§42 prior to same date. In no case shall arbitrator enter an award which calls for re-instatement; any award entered may only award monetary damages on a breach of contract theory.

Consistent with state law, the District may elect not to renew an Administrator's contract beyond a stated expiration date. The District's decision not to extend or renew a contract after a stated expiration date shall not be considered a dismissal or discharge. Under this agreement a non-renewal or decision not to extend the contract is not subject to the arbitration clause herein.

2. <u>Duties/Responsibilities:</u> The Administrator shall perform all duties/responsibilities as specified in the job description approved by the District for the position specified below and further duties as assigned.

Re: Salary Adjustment for Non-Union Personnel

I am seeking your approval to adjust the base salary for 19 non-union employees of the Tewksbury Public Schools. A two and a half percent (2.5%) adjustment is in line with recently approved labor agreements calling for a two and a half percent (2.5%) salary adjustment for the 2018-2019 school year.

The attached table identifies the positions, base 2017-2018 salary, and the dollar value of a two and a half percent (2.5%) salary adjustment. The overall cost of a salary adjustment for this group of 30 employees is \$28,857.45.
