
about building relationships with the kids," says Eli. "That's how coaching works too. If kids believe in you they'll respond well. Then the possibilities are endless."

Jitsu Club, says Eli. "How do we motivate each individual? How do we feed the fire?"



his year has been a big one for the Adult Services program as we've settled into our larger space. More space has enabled us to offer improved and expanded learning opportunities to the adults in the Today and Tomorrow program. The space, which we share with Mass Rehab, is located right off the highway, which means less time on the road for individuals, whether they're headed from home or to the job site. What do our individuals have to say about the past year?

Mike Koczan – "I like working at BMS all year and doing the packages and mail. I like being able to see and talk to all the other staff that work at BMS. 
community every day and go to all the different sites."


